About Us

St. John's College and Chundikuli Girls' College are two of the oldest and well known educational institutions in Jaffna Sri Lanka, founded by Church Missionary Society (CMS) in 1823 and 1896 respectively. Since their inception, the colleges have been striving to provide quality education to boys and girls from all parts of the Island from primary to secondary levels. The 30 year civil war has been a great challenge to the schools in the past, and rebuilding the lives of children who have lost years of schooling as a result of the war, is one of the challenges faced by colleges at present. The "Chundikuli Trust Fund" (CTF), a registered charity in the UK formed by the UK resident Alumni of St John's and Chundikuli Girls' College in 1984, has maintained dynamic contact with the parent Institutions, supporting improvement of educational facilities and providing opportunities for the education of those in need through scholarships and bursaries.

The "Eagle Nest" project was established by CTF in 2009. This project provides long term educational support for 148 Internally Displaced children through the support of national and international donors and sponsors. The "Eagle Nest" project is also providing support for the education of visually impaired and handicapped children in Chundikuli and in Nuffield school at Kaithady.

The CTF has also been supporting others in need, outsides the school communities. The supply of essential food items and medicine in the aftermath of the Asian Tsunami of December 2004, is one such project.

We are also supporting Educational support classes in 4 Support Centres in Vanni. These centres provide educational support for children in formal education and also provides extra lessons for those who need extra help. Several vocational and self employment training programmes are also being undertaken in addition to the above.

Through reports, testimonies and pictures, this report brings to you, the achievements of what you, with CTF, are supporting.

We are happy to report that the Eagle Nest project administered by the Chundikuli Trust Fund is progressing as planned. The internally displaced children admitted to St. John's College and Chundikuli Girls College and children from other schools who are supported by this programme, have now settled in their respective schools.

The programme which has been providing Educational support to these children from 2009 onwards has 148 children under its wings. We are very proud to report that four of our students entered Universities and Colleges last year, and another batch of students are awaiting admission this year.

Apart from providing Educational support to these children, the Eagle Nest programme, has been vigilant regarding the overall development of the children. The children are provided with opportunities to cultivate their talents and interests like music and sport. The sight-seeing trips and movie nights also provide the children with much needed entertainment. The visits and letters from sponsors cause much excitement among the children, and they are always appreciative of what is being done for them. For the benefit of the students whose progress is still a concern, steps are being taken to carry out a complete physical and psychological evaluation by qualified medical personnel, in order to provide them with appropriate assistance.

All of the above play an important role in helping the children get over their losses due to the war, settle down and work towards a bright future. We thank all our sponsors, past pupils of the two schools, and well wishers who made this possible. Your timely help has made a big difference in the lives of these children.

But as we all know, the best way to help these children is through education. They need extra help and care to get back to normality, and the Eagle Nest programme does just that.

For all good deeds, there are barriers in everything. Health problems and lack of resources are the main issues at present. We have discovered that physical and mental disabilities might be hindering these children from living a normal life. So the health and mental issues should be addressed and special education should be given if needed. For that new materials and resources may be required.

But on the whole, this programme renders tremendous service to these children, and I thank the sponsors from the bottom of my heart for making this programme work, and hope that you will continue to help to light up these lives in the future.

Our Projects

Light for Life

8 visually handicapped children at Nuffield School and Chundikuli Girls' College are supported by Eagle nest to continue their Education. These children lost their eyesight as a result of the war and some have lost their upper limbs as well. They dropped out of school as a result, and did attend school until they joined Nuffield School and CGC. They are now provided with all materials and financial assistance required to continue their education.

They are also provided with voice recorders to help them record and revise their lessons in class. The girls at CGC have been provided with a laptop and they now follow computing lessons at CGC using software for visually handicapped. They feel that in addition to helping them in their secondary Education, it will also enhance their employment opportunities after the completion of formal Education.

These children are also provided with tuition assistance according to their needs, so that they can make up for the lost years.

6 of the children have passed the G.C.E. O/L examination and are now following A/L classes. These children dream of becoming professionals in their selected fields by pursuing higher Education after A/Ls, and thanks to the generous help of our sponsors, this is now possible.







Education Support Programme

Though the children have achieved considerable overall development in the past two years, the non-attendance of school for a long period of time during the war time, has had a negative impact on the academic standards of these children. Most of the children do not meet the required standards for their grades especially in English Language, Mathematics and Science. Therefore, an Education support programme was initiated as a joint project between Eagle Nest UK and SJC_DCETF Canada during the latter part of 2011, to provide tuition support to these children.

Currently, five experienced part-time English Language teachers have been employed to help the children at St. John's College, Chundikuli Girls' College and Karuna Nilayam, Kilinochchi. A science teacher has been recruited to help the children in CGC as well.

The children are taught poetry and drama in addition to their regular English lesson and this has helped raise their self-esteem. This is clearly seen in the increasing number of children who enthusiastically take part in programmes in English in school.

The children can also sit for English spoken and written exams held by Institute of Western Music and Speech when they reach the required standards. Around 25 children are sitting for the exams to be held in November/December this year.

We are planning to provide tuition assistance to the children who need help in other subjects as well, in the next phase of this programme.





St. John's Support Centres

Although most of the families in Vanni have resettled in their own places by now, they are still struggling to rebuild permanent housing and livelihoods since the job opportunities are very scarce. As a result, the parents are unable to provide nutritious food and conducive environment for their studies at home after school. Therefore St. John's College has established 4 support centres in Tharmapuram, Uduthurai, Shanthapuram, and Thaneeruthu in the Vanni region.

Eagle Nest supports this project by providing evening study facilities for the children in those areas. Around 115 children attend these classes at present. This will be complemented by the provision of at least one nutritious meal for each child every day. The other proposed activities are as follows:

- 1. Conducting exam oriented classes at SJC during vacations.
- 2. Taking SJC Teachers to organize Special classes in other Districts
- 3. Organizing Shramadana Trips/ Curricular-Co curricular Trips for SJC students to other Districts.
- 4. Providing essential needs to the needy children



Other Activities

All Souls Day

The children take time on all souls day, to remember their loved ones who passed away during the war, by lighting candles in remembrance of their dear ones.

Violin Classes

The girls at CGC are now enjoying violin lessons, thanks to our generous sponsors who provided them with violins and pay for their lessons. They girls have a total of eight violins now, and they have 2 hours of lessons every week at the CGC hostel.

Movie Night

The children are provided with opportunities to watch selected English and Tamil movies twice a month, and this event is made more interesting by the provision of snacks and tea. The girls at CGC further add to the fun by making the snacks themselves.

Trips

Occasional sight-seeing trips and trips to the beach provide the children with opportunities to visit places of interest as well as to lighten up.





Remembering Mr. Daniel Jeyakumar Thevathason

Mr. D.J. Thevathason or 'Thevathason master' as he was fondly called, was called to rest on the 14th of November 2011, leaving behind a void which cannot be filled easily.


